## Dear Colleagues,

The next annual NNEPA conference will be at **University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, October 17-18** under the coordination of the new NNEPA president, Professor Timothy Nulty.

Our distinguished keynote speaker will be Professor Stephen Yablo, Professor of Philosophy in the Department of Linguistics and Philosophy at MIT, and Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Much of his work is in contemporary metaphysics, philosophy of language, and philosophical logic, including such topics as mental causation, epiphenomenalism, supervenience, identity and essence, properties, existence, metaphor, figurative language and fictionalism, intentionality or aboutness, conceivability and possibility, definition, and paradox and truth. Among other accomplishments, he has shown that a long-standing widely endorsed diagnostic of the root of liar-like paradoxes in some form of self-reflexivity or circularity is mistaken.

Many of his important papers have been collected in two volumes: *Thoughts: Papers on Mind, Meaning, and Modality (Philosophical Papers, Volume 1)*, OUP, 2008 (exploring Cartesian themes in the metaphysics of mind, especially issues in modal epistemology and mental causation) and *Things: Philosophical Papers, Volume 2*, OUP, 2010, exploring first-order topics in contemporary analytic metaphysics, as well as topics in meta-metaphysics, developing a presupposition-based alternative to the role of pretense in factionalism about abstracta.
