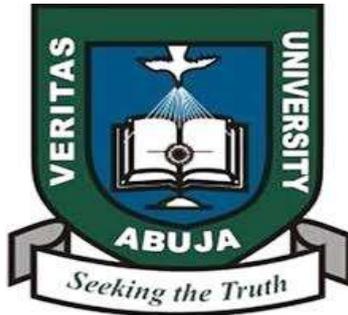

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Executive Summary

The International Conference on “Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): Challenges, Pathways, and Prospects for Africa” is a collaborative initiative between Veritas University, Abuja, and The Kukah Center, designed to create a robust platform for critical dialogue, knowledge exchange, and strategic action on the implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals in Africa. This high-level conference brings together academics, policymakers, development practitioners, civil society organizations, the private sector, and international agencies to examine the pressing challenges hindering the attainment of the SDGs across the African continent. This conference anticipates 1000 expected participants (In-person and virtual attendance) from all sectors. It will also explore innovative pathways and practical solutions tailored to Africa’s unique socio-economic, political, and environmental contexts. The conference will feature keynote speeches, panel discussions, academic paper presentations, workshops, and networking sessions, all designed to generate actionable insights and foster cross-sectoral collaboration. Participants will discuss key themes including poverty reduction, education, gender equality, climate change, good governance, and partnerships for sustainable development. A central outcome of the conference will be the development of policy recommendations and strategic frameworks to accelerate SDG implementation in Africa. To ensure the success and impact of the conference, a comprehensive evaluation framework has been designed with clear indicators of success, including participant diversity, engagement levels, media coverage, policy impact, and follow-up initiatives. By providing a platform for open dialogue and solution-driven engagement, the conference aspires to contribute meaningfully to Africa’s sustainable development journey and the realization of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

Project Description

The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), adopted in 2015, present a universal blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all by 2030. The 17 Sustainable Development Goals include: Ending poverty, Zero Hunger, Good Health and Well-being, Ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education for all, Gender Equality, Clean Water and Sanitation, Affordable and Clean Energy, Providing Decent Work and Economic Growth, Building resilient infrastructure, Reducing Inequalities, Building Sustainable Cities and Communities, Promoting Responsible Consumption and Production, Taking urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts, Conserving and sustaining use the oceans, seas and marine resources, Protecting, restoring and promoting sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, and Promoting peaceful and inclusive societies, Promoting Partnerships for the Goals. With less than a decade remaining to meet these ambitious targets, many countries, including Nigeria, face significant challenges such as poverty, inequality, climate change, and governance deficits.

Recognizing the critical role of academia, civil society, and faith-based institutions in advancing sustainable development, Veritas University, Abuja, in collaboration with The Kukah Center, proposes to organize an International Conference on the

SDGs. The conference aims to foster dialogue, share research, promote partnerships, and galvanize actionable commitments towards achieving the SDGs in Nigeria, Africa, and globally.

Statement of the Problem

Despite the universal adoption of the SDGs, Africa remains one of the regions most at risk of missing the 2030 targets. Structural challenges such as extreme poverty, fragile governance, conflicts, environmental degradation, and inequality continue to hamper progress. Moreover, the COVID-19 pandemic, economic shocks, and climate-induced disasters have reversed many of the gains made over the past decade.

Current approaches have often failed to adequately address local realities, marginalized voices, and systemic inequalities. There is an urgent need to re-examine pathways to sustainable development through innovative, inclusive, and context-sensitive solutions tailored to Africa's unique socio-economic and political landscape.

Literature Review & Gaps

Globally, the SDGs represent an integrated framework of 17 goals designed to address interconnected development challenges (UN, 2015). Global progress has been uneven, with low-income countries, particularly in Sub-Saharan Africa, lagging. In Africa, the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UNECA) has observed that most African countries are off-track in achieving key SDG targets, particularly those related to poverty (SDG 1), education (SDG 4), and inequality (SDG 10). Factors contributing to this include governance deficits, limited financial resources, and inadequate data for monitoring.

Concerning governance and institutions, scholars like Acemoglu and Robinson (2012) argue that inclusive institutions are crucial for sustainable development. Poor governance, corruption, and political instability remain barriers in many African states. Africa contributes the least to global greenhouse gas emissions, but is most vulnerable to climate change impacts (IPCC Reports, 2019, 2021, 2022, 2023). Literature highlights the importance of resilience-building and renewable energy transitions in achieving SDG 13.

Achieving gender equality (SDG 5) is essential for broader development goals. Studies (UN Women, 2025) emphasize women's empowerment as a transformative force for achieving multiple SDGs. Emerging research underlines the role of digital technologies, fintech, and renewable energy in achieving sustainable development (World Bank, 2024). Limited research on the role of faith-based organizations and community-driven development in SDG realization. Inadequate focus on indigenous knowledge systems and their relevance to sustainability.

Aim and Objectives

This conference aims to bring together scholars, policymakers, practitioners, and stakeholders from around the world to discuss progress, challenges, and opportunities in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The conference will provide a platform for sharing knowledge, experiences, and best practices, fostering partnerships, and identifying actionable solutions to accelerate progress towards the SDGs.

Specific Objectives Include:

- a. To critically examine progress towards the SDGs at local, national, and regional levels.

Justification

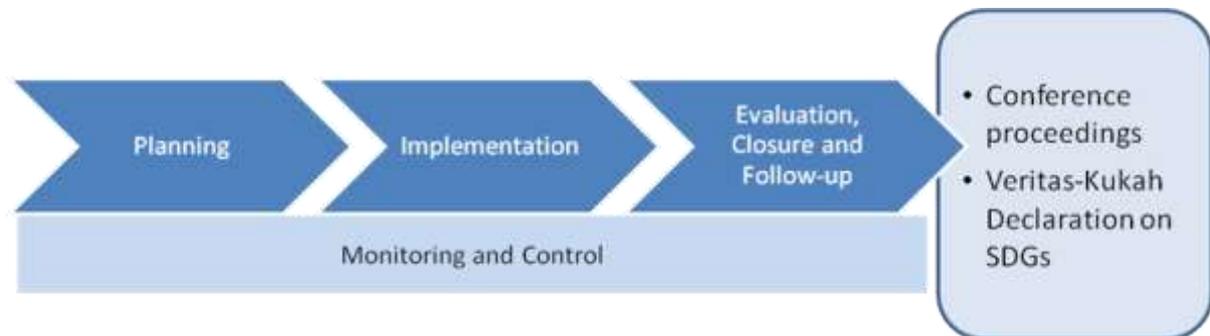
- a. Examine Africa’s specific developmental challenges through an SDG lens.
