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## Keynote Presentation Troy Richardson Cornell University



Decolonization is a term that has circulated in scholarly and popular domains for much of the twentieth century and arguably longer. The kind of education pertinent to a decolonial project, broadly understood, varies significantly however across and within these discussions. This is most especially true given the range of thinkers enacting decolonizing in so many differing places and historical contexts around the world.

Recognizing the many differences and tensions that attend to such a situation, Professor Richardson will nonetheless outline the importance of decolonial perspectives for philosophers of education .

**Troy A. Richardson (Saponi/Tuscarora) is a Philosopher of Education and American Indian Studies at Cornell University. His work has been primarily concerned with questions of ethics, relationality and coloniality especially in the contexts of the inclusion of Indigenous peoples in classroom curriculum.**

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
