"Compass" is a pun on MAP: the workshop is intended to help undergraduates "find their way" in the discipline. The Virginia Tech COMPASS workshop is one day in which participants will discuss articles, learn how to find scholarships, learn about conferences and academic journals, and explore how you can continue doing philosophy after your undergraduate years.

How to apply:

Send applications to **vatechmap@gmail.com by February 15th**. Participants will be notified of decisions by March 1st. In your application, please provide the following: (1) Cover sheet including name, email, school, program

level, graduation date, whether you've attended other diversity institutes, and areas of interest

(2) Academic statement: Describe your background in Philosophy. What areas of Philosophy interest you the most and why? What are your future plans in studying Philosophy? (Maximum length: 2 page double spaced)
(3) Personal statement: Describe your experience as a member of an underrepresented group in Philosophy and/or your sustained commitment to diversity in Philosophy, and how you think you will benefit from COMPASS. (Maximum length: 2 pages double spaced)
(4) Would you need financial aid in order to attend?
(optional - please note that we cannot guarantee funding)
